

For a Question By line, I stroke Q and then the speaker stroke:

BY SPEAKER #1:(Question) is STKPWHR/STPHAQ

For Examination headers, I throw in the alternate bank: STPH-FRPBLGTS is EXAMINATION BY SPEAKER #1, etc.

The reason I'm such a fan of this system is it works at every depo in every situation. I don't have to do a bunch of custom entries for every job, don't have which character flaw or disfiguring feature I'm gonna use to identify everyone in the room, don't have to wonder did I call the guy RED/RED for his tie or B his head or DIK/DIK for his personality. If he's sitting on my left side in the first chair, he's STPHAO every day of the week, every job.

Just my two cents, G-Man.

I use the single stroke upper left plus left vowels, lower left plus vowels, etc. But because I work in a capital where there's lots of aministrative work with r speakers, I also use letter plus answer bank combinations and have them in my master speaker chart, e.g.:

I decide who's who and chart them out. It's usually based on the first letter of the last name, like A for Adams, but if A is already taken, I try to come up welse memorable, like B for bald or J for jerk. It really doesn't matter as long as it's charted out, though.

Then I use letters in combination with the answer bank for people in court, which could easily be used in depos to identify other people. For the Court I use STPHEUAOFPLT.

We usually have more than 40 cases and less than 100 each day. I only do this for a spotless RT I the judge reviews it months later, he knows who's talking and not DEF: or PLF:
